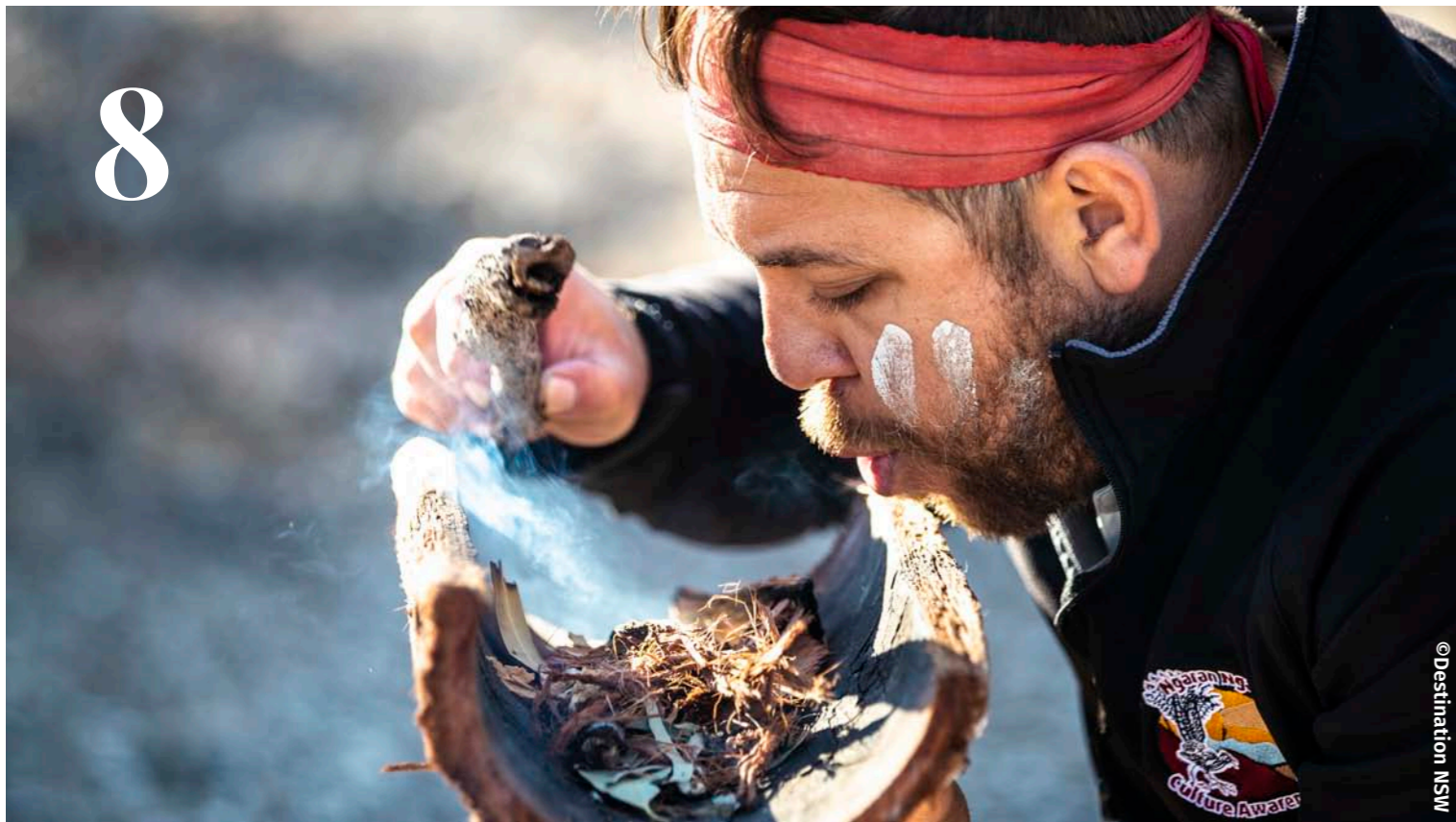

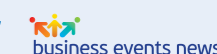
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Camel Rock, NSW

For foodies



Talking Tapas

A snack does not normally constitute a meal, but a series of delicious snacks in one sitting certainly can. Enter the Spanish culinary concept of tapas, popularised by the Spanish people and their delicious, yet unusual, eating habits. Traditionally, the people of Spain would bar hop and eat small snacks along the way before tucking into their dinner, which is sometimes served as late as 11pm. So, the next time you find yourself in Spain, here is a quick guide to some delicious spots.

Leon

The bars in this city tend to serve up simple tapas dishes with every drink ordered, from tasty local cheese and chorizo, to scrumptious fried potatoes glazed in homemade aioli. The best tapas bars here are in the bustling old-world Barrio Humedo district.

San Sebastian

This artistic mecca is famed for its plethora of fancy restaurants and bars. When in town and after some tasty tapas, head on down to the old quarter of the city. There you will find bars stocked with local delights, such as

traditional anchovy, olive and chilli skewers and sheep's cheese risotto. Baaarilliant!

Logrono

Logrono is revered for its winemaking but don't let that reputation fool you, tapas are also a highly sought-after commodity around these parts. The money spot in this city is Calle Laurel, boasting more than 30 tapas bars in just a two-block stretch. Each venue here enjoys a distinct food identity, whether it is El Soriano's grilled mushroom and prawn dishes or the patatas bravas on offer at Bar Jubera.

In the News



Loyalty wars

Qantas and Virgin Australia are engaged in a battle for the hearts and minds of the country's frequent flyers, in a tit-for-tat skirmish offering to match the status of top tier members of their respective loyalty programs.

The first salvo was launched by Qantas just over a week ago, offering bonus status credits and lounge access to eligible travellers with rival airlines.

However this morning Virgin Australia hit back with a "Discover Gold Status Match" offer of a three month membership - and if travellers take just one eligible flight and earn 80

status credits in that period they will also receive an additional Velocity Gold membership for a travelling companion.

Virgin is also extending existing Platinum and Gold status until 31 March 2022 as long as members take one flight before 28 March 2021.

Kimberley on cruise radar

Although international cruise ships are still currently banned from Australian waters, several operators are looking forward to the likely easing of restrictions next year which could allow a domestic Kimberley cruise season to take place.

In fact such is the demand for close-to-home cruising that Silversea Cruises last week unveiled three additional itineraries in the iconic region, with the extra nine-day sailings between Darwin and Broome aboard the 144-passenger *Silver Explorer* now scheduled for May and June 2021.

Silversea's Kimberley fares include flights, transfers and a pre-cruise hotel night, as well as butler service, complimentary beverages, wi-fi and gratuities.

Adding to the experience, on-board cuisine is inspired by the flavours of Western Australia, inspired by Executive Chef Alan Groom from the Kimberley's own El Questro Homestead.

Immerse yourself in country

According to Tourism Research Australia, while 11% of international travellers will take part in an indigenous experience on their holiday to Australia, only 1% of domestic travellers do the same. With international borders closed, there has never been a better time to get to know the culture and traditions of Aboriginal Australians, and luckily there are plenty to enjoy in NSW. Sarah Beyer discovers just some of what the state has to offer.

Across NSW, Aboriginal culture is vibrant and diverse, with a range of experiences allowing travellers the chance to gather on country and learn from the traditional owners. You can take an Aboriginal-led guided tour, follow ancient songlines on walking tracks, experience traditional ceremonies and visit Aboriginal rock art in many of the state's national parks.

Gadigal & Eora Country, Sydney

Before Sydney grew into the metropolis it is today, the Gadigal and Eora people lived on the land. You can explore the city through the eyes of its Indigenous people on tours with Dreamtime Southern X, an Aboriginal privately-owned company which offers a range of walking and bus tours connecting visitors with the Dreamtime of Sydney.

If you're looking for a tour focusing on one area of the city, try the Aboriginal Heritage Tour in the Sydney Royal Botanic Garden which teaches travellers Aboriginal plant uses and culture and gives them the chance to taste bush foods, or else the Barangaroo Aboriginal Cultural Tours which offers a hands-on educational tour of the precinct which is the only large public park exclusively planted with natives in NSW.

Alternatively, visit the Australian Museum and head to the permanent Bayala Nura: Yarning Country exhibition to discover Australia's Indigenous people through their artefacts and stories.

Yuin Country, South Coast

Narooma and the Tilba region of the south coast is part of Yuin country, and visitors to this part of the state can experience Indigenous culture with Ngaran Ngaran Culture Awareness (NNCA).

NNCA offers an immersive cultural experience with the Yuin Retreat. Over three days, travellers will visit many parts of the Narooma region that have held sacred significance to the Yuin Aboriginal community for tens of thousands of years.

The tour begins on the evening of day one with a welcome to Yuin country including language, song and smoking ceremony. Highlights of the next two days include a sunrise ceremony, Gulaga National Park guided day walk tour or Djirringanj dreaming experience, Indigenous dining prepared by expert chefs and discovery of Aboriginal wellness. Travellers will participate in and witness Aboriginal dance, yidaki (didgeridoo) and yarning circles, while learning from knowledgeable Aboriginal guides.

Gumbaynggirr country, Coffs Harbour

Travellers can combine a love for adventure with learning about the local Aboriginal community when they join Wajaana Yaam Gumbaynggirr Adventure Tours. “Wajaana Yaam” translates to ‘from this country’ in the local Gumbaynggirr language and the tour operator offers a range of stand up paddle-boarding adventures all run by local Aboriginal people.

The tours explore Coffs Harbour’s Solitary Islands Marine Park across 2.5 hours, starting from three different locations depending on the tide. You’ll paddle with the direct descendants of the world’s first stand up paddlers and get a chance to connect to the land and the sea through the stories and language of the local Indigenous people, along with collecting and tasting seasonal bush tucker.

If paddle boarding isn’t your thing, Unkya Local Aboriginal Land Council Cultural Eco Tours runs two Aboriginal experiences operating out of Scotts Head and Gaagal Wanggaan (South Beach) National Park near Mackville, sharing and promoting the unique Gumbaynggirr spirituality and culture.

The Gaagal Yuludarla (Ocean Dreaming) Tour is a 1.5 hour walk around Scott’s Head Headland and Junay Gaagal (Little Beach) where travellers will get to hear about food sources and hunting methods, totems and creation stories, see a traditional fish trap and taste bush tucker along the way.

For a longer tour, the 3.5 hour Gaagal Wanggan (South Beach) Tour takes in Aboriginal-owned Gaagal Wanggaan (South Beach) National Park. You’ll get a chance to hear about the culture and heritage of the Gumbaynggirr people from your local Aboriginal guide, as well as learning about the ecosystems within the national park. Your guide will tell you about how the land, rivers and ocean are the first people’s food source, medicine and way of life.

Worimi country, Port Stephens

Get your heart racing and learn about Aboriginal culture at the same time with Sand

Dune Adventures in Port Stephens. You'll hop on a quad bike tour and explore the majestic and traditional landscape of the Worimi sand dunes. The area has been recorded as the largest coastal moving sand mass in the Southern Hemisphere and is a significant area to the local Worimi Aboriginal people. The tour ventures into exclusive Aboriginal land and gives travellers a hands-on interactive experience of the richness of the Worimi culture and heritage. Dig for fresh water, learn about bush resources, ride past ancient camp sites and sand board down one of the largest dunes on the beach over 1.5 hours.



Wiradjuri country, Wagga Wagga

Discover Wiradjuri culture in an intimate setting with Bundy Cultural Tours. Owned and operated by Wiradjuri man Mark Saddler, you'll get a chance to meet Australian bush animals, learn how a didgeridoo, spear or stone axe is made and find out more about the oldest living culture. Each and every tour is designed so that travellers will get to feel part of the land and get up close and personal with Indigenous culture. Options include full- and half-day tours by bus or 4WD in the Riverina area, as well as a two hour walking tour around Wagga Wagga, taking in the Murrumbidgee River.

BBQ meals and morning tea are included on some tours, as well as local transfers from your accommodation, while Bundy Cultural Tours can also create a custom private tour for travellers, such as the Wiradjuri Culture and Winery Private tour which visits areas special to the Wiradjuri people as well as stopping at Courabyra Wines for lunch.

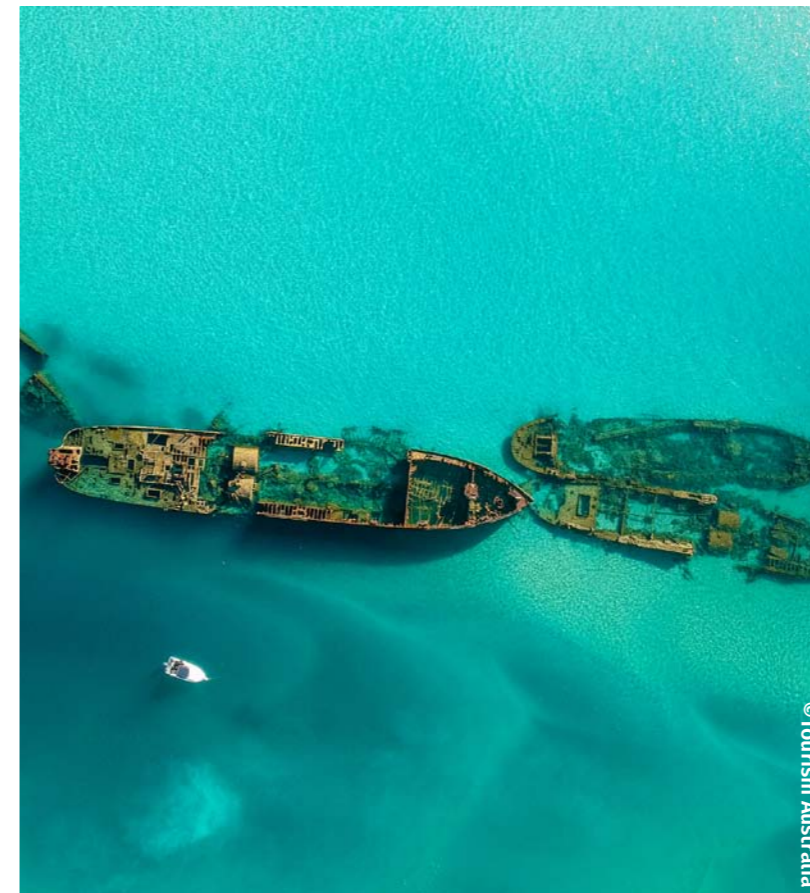


Lord Howe Island, NSW

With international travel on hold for the foreseeable future, closer-to-home bucket list destinations such as Lord Howe Island have jumped to the top of everyone's list. The fact that the entirety of Lord Howe Island is designated as a marine park will give you some idea of the beauty you're in for, with more than 450 fish species and 100 different types of coral. Hawksbill sea turtles and blue knifefish are a couple of favourites for divers to spot in the world's most southerly coral reef.

Busselton Jetty, WA

Stretching almost two kilometres offshore, Busselton Jetty is the world's longest wooden jetty, and is said to be Australia's largest artificial reef, playing home to more than 300 marine species. Owing to the destination's popularity, a multitude of options are available, with Dive Busselton Jetty offering dives, guided and self-guided snorkels, as well as undersea walks, and even night dives.



Moreton Island, QLD

If you have never dived or snorkelled before and want to be wowed, Moreton Island may be the best place to start. Many are drawn to the region's artificial ridge, Curtin Reef, as well as Flinders Reef – the only coral reef that can be reached by boat from Brisbane. However, Tangalooma Ship Wrecks, located north of Tangalooma Island Resort, offer the region's greatest prize – a thriving man-made ecosystem for a range of local marine life, including dolphins, sea turtles, wobbegongs and more than 200 species of fish.

Ningaloo Reef, WA

Many snorkellers love Ningaloo Reef, as it's not only a UNESCO World Heritage site, but it's also Australia's largest fringing reef, meaning it's located minutes from the shore, making it perfect for all skill levels and all ages. At around 300 kilometres in length and home to 500 species of fish and 250 species of coral, Ningaloo Reef is a once-in-a-lifetime experience, and arguably the best way to explore it is underwater.

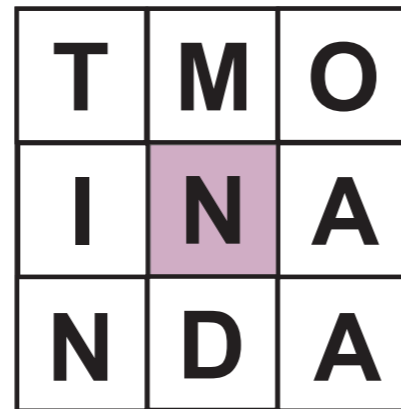

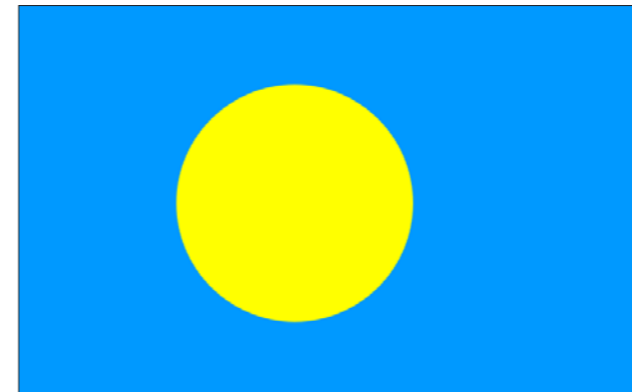

In a design similar to that of the flag of Bangladesh, this country's ensign also has a circle which is slightly off-centre, likely to frustrate perfectionists.

The flag was adopted officially in 1980, after a competition in 1979 to design a new flag. This design was chosen from over 1,000 different entries. The circle in the centre represents the moon, which holds special significance to the people of the country, with a full moon traditionally the best time for fishing, planting and other activities. 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Where in the world?

This horse racing track is famous for hosting an annual race, named after the state that the track is located in. The track is 2km long and the famous race run on it is often referred to as "the run for the roses" due to the winner being draped with a blanket of roses. The venue was built in the 1890s, with the grandstand with its two spires (pictured here) added in 1995 after the original builders ran out of funds and sold the project to a different party. Make it at home

Michelada

Serves 2

With Christmas drawing close, many workplaces have end of year celebrations coming up. If you have a bit of a heavy head, there's supposedly nothing like the hair of the dog to pick you up. This cocktail is a Mexican drink made from similar ingredients to a Bloody Mary and apparently has the same hangover curing powers. We'll have to trust the inventors on this one - we're a bit doubtful that it will solve your feeling under the weather, but it's certainly a tasty cocktail to try (but maybe save it for happy hour!)

Ingredients

350ml tomato juice
60ml lime juice
1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
1 tbsp Soy sauce
Hot sauce to taste (suggestion is around 2 tsp)
Chilli powder if you like it spicy
1 bottle Mexican beer i.e. Tecate or Corona etc
Salt to rim glass

Method

Run a lime wedge around the rim of a glass and dip in sea salt. Fill beer glass with ice cubes. Add half of tomato juice, lime juice, Worcestershire sauce, soy sauce, hot sauce and chilli powder if you're game. Top with Mexican beer. Repeat with other glass. Stir and enjoy immediately.
